

Dear Son Gordon:

April 2, 1944.

Your mother and I have been spending a very quiet Sunday at home. I stayed in bed until about 1 P.M., went down to S. P. Henry's for the N.Y. Times at 4 P.M. and have been reading the political news in the Columbus Citizen since. The day outside has been about what could be expected for April 2.

Things have been going along about as usual, except that I have been busier at the office and had matters on hand that were more or less technical which got on my nerves to such an extent that I was glad to quit and come home yesterday noon.

I am handicapped at the office by not having a competent stenographer and Mattie is too old to work as she has in the past.

I have been racking my brains for a subject for a paper to read at the Twilight Club in June. Three subjects have suggested themselves to me, "Pirates", "Polygamy" and "Hendel Millie" and I will probably take the last. However, by June, he may be so far out of the Presidential nomination race that the paper would be a flop. A paper on "Pirates" to be read outdoors in July or August might be better. When we were at Williamsburg on our way back from your Gilman Commencement

ment I found an old book in one of the buildings, which was a report of the trial of Captain Kidd, which has possibilities but I have never been able to get a copy of it. It was bound in sheep and printed in type like our old family bible.

We have been much excited over the new Peggy Kinder. George has phoned four or five times and we have thus kept up to date on developments. Jane and the baby went home Thursday. I understand Rappy is boarded out for the time being.

No doubt your mother has written you about the new dining room furniture.
